In 2008, Maryhaven became CARF Accredited



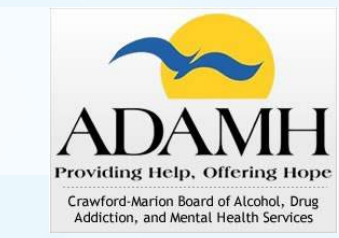
2013

In 2015, Maryhaven awarded funding from Crawford Marion ADAMH Board to provide services.

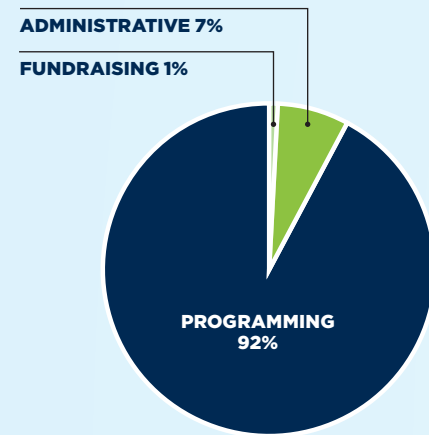


2017

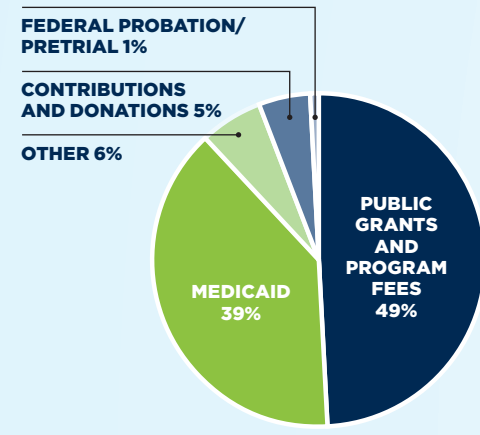
In 2017, Osteopathic Heritage Foundations gave \$750,000 to Addiction Stabilization efforts. Largest single gift in Maryhaven's History.

MARYHAVEN'S ADDICTION STABILIZATION CENTER



In collaboration with the ADAMH Board of Franklin County and as part of the Franklin County Opiate Action Plan launched by the City of Columbus and Franklin County, Maryhaven opened the Addiction Stabilization Center on January 19, 2018. This Center is a 55-bed treatment facility on the south side of Columbus and is devoted to the care of individuals who have recently experienced an opiate overdose or are at high-risk to experience an opiate overdose. From conception to completion this project took 7 months! It would not have happened without the help of all our community partners.

77 PERCENT OF CLIENTS WHO ARE DISCHARGED FROM RESIDENTIAL ARE BEING LINKED TO FURTHER TREATMENT.

Since Maryhaven's Addiction Stabilization Center opened, January 19, 2018:

- We have served over 1,721 people in the triage unit.
- Over 90% of MASC clients have received detox services.
- 40 of the clients have been pregnant women who after coming through MASC continue on to Maryhaven's Women's Center, which is a long-term residential program for women and their children. Most of these women, who were not receiving prenatal services prior to their admission, thanks to Maryhaven and Wexner OSU Stable Cradle program, are now being helped to stabilize not only their addiction but their pregnancies. This is a unique service in the community.

A LETTER FROM SHAWN



This year Maryhaven celebrates 65 years of removing barriers, increasing access and expanding the scope of treatment services available. In an effort to meet the growing needs of the community, Maryhaven took steps to maximize resources and expand services where possible. As a result of these efforts, we opened a new residential treatment facility (Maryhaven Addiction

Stabilization Center) - thus increasing the capacity for clients who needed immediate access to treatment. In fact, we are on pace to provide critical triage, detoxification and residential treatment to over 1800 patients since opening last January. The continued dedication to providing outpatient services (Medical Assisted Treatment) has allowed Maryhaven to offer a similar continuum of treatment for individuals who are able to access treatment outside of a traditional inpatient model. Furthermore, in an effort to immediately engage individuals into treatment, we have reorganized our admissions procedures and staff rotations to better assist clients to begin the recovery process.. A combination of the aforementioned efforts allowed for a significant decrease in the number of clients on the "wait-list" at any given time.

It has been an exciting year for the Maryhaven family, staff, and patients, and I am proud of the hard work and dedication of our team. Saving lives, fostering hope, and strengthening families and our community is more than just a vision, at Maryhaven, it is a way of life!
